Right to Provision

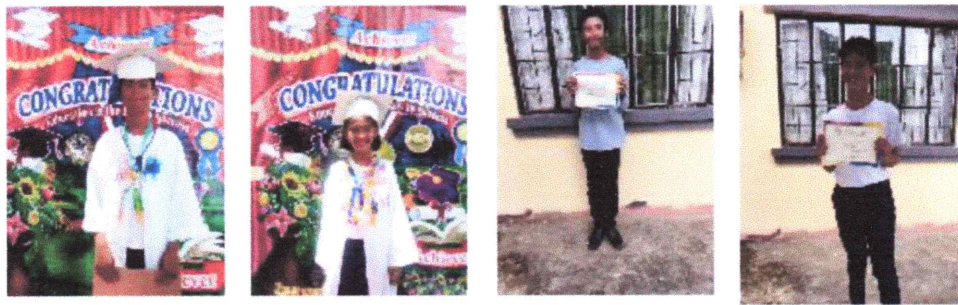
Every child has the right to resources and services that are necessary to ensure survival, skill and development to their full potential.

Right to Protection

That children are ensured and protected from acts of exploitation, abuse by the adults or institutions that threatens their dignity, survival and development.

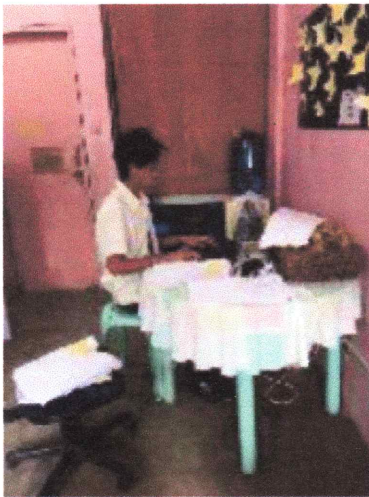
Republic Act 10627 otherwise known as Anti Bullying Act was exhaustedly discussed with the children from the perspective of a psychologist, sociologist, lawyer and a religious worker. Sociologist, pointed out that the social milieu like the school, neighborhood and family.

The psychologist emphasized that it is a pent up emotion based on gender, class and hierarchy. From the legal perspective, bullying is a crime that requires intervention to be provided. A religious perspective presented the Biblical story who was bullied. Instead of retaliating, he did not showed anger nor retaliation but in humility prayed.

Republic Act 7610. A special protection for children against abused, exploitation and discrimination. After two years, justice is served to a 14 year old child who was abused. The verdict was guilty for an imprisonment from 8-14 years.

Right to Participation

That children are provided with the means by which they can engage in the process of change the will bring about the realization of their rights and prepare them in the society and change.



Mentoring. The Junior and Senior High students are observed very capable as Junior Staff. In line with their field of interest and available work in the office, the older children were trained in Bookkeeping and in kitchen.

Independent Living. Those who are in the Senior High School or 18 years old are given opportunities to support their school needs. After school, four hours are spent by 6.45% to earn for selling Street Foods.



Community Partnership

1. **Advocacy on the Child Protection** is not limited within Gugma sa Kabataan, Inc. (GSK) Secondary Schools were visited by invitation to speak on Child Protection. Together with the Staff, 6.45% of the kids shared the circumstances as witnessed of violence, victims of all forms of abused and abandonment have raised awareness and committed advocates on Childs Right to Provision, Protection and Participation.
2. **Tutorial.** A Memorandum of Agreement was made between two (2) universities – College of Arts & Sciences of Lourdes College and the College of Education of Liceo de Cagayan University to support the tutorial services of Gugma sa Kabataan in the areas of Language, Mathematics, Science, Physical Education, Library Science and Psychology.
3. **Supplemental Feeding.** FICCO Foundation and GSK made an agreement on Supplemental Feeding advocating on the *provision right* to rehabilitate malnutrition of the children.

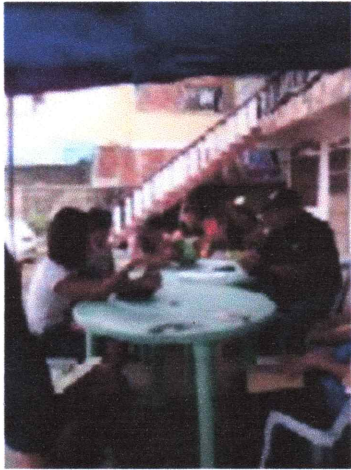
The figure presented the progress report on the nutrition status of the children from severe to moderate to mild malnutrition.

There is no longer severe cases as revealed two years ago.

Tardiness and absenteeism has been eradicated.



4. **Christian Education.** GSK is one of the outreaches of the United Church of Christ in the Philippines (UCCP) of Cagayan de Oro City. On Tuesdays, a Bible Study is conducted for the parents of GSK clients. The Junior High School clients joined the Youth Choir which performed during the 2018 Christmas Cantata.



5. **Cagayan de Oro Council for the Protection of Children.** GSK is a member of the council. For 6 consecutive years, the Executive Director has been appointed as the Vice-Chairperson of which the City Mayor Oscar Moreno is the Chairperson of the said council. The programs and services of GSK became known on its programs and services. The support of FICCO for breakfast was part of the advocacy in Barangay. GSK benefits from the agencies represented in the council i.e. support from the children and women desk of the Police in case of emergency.
6. **Angeles Sisters National High School** have elected the Executive Director as the President of the School Governing Council. It is a privilege and opportunity to advocate on the Child's Protection. As a public school, students experienced humiliation, abused verbally, obliged to give contribution.
7. **Area-Based Standard Network (ABS-NET)** is the wider body of non-government organization in the Region of which GSK is a member. Ms. Devine Grace Dagang was elected as the Assistant Secretary in Region X. Capacity building for staff and updates on Guidelines and policies on Social Welfare Development Agencies kept GSK informed.

8. **BALAOOD MINDANAW** is a non-government organization addressing the issues on Human Trafficking. GSK is a beneficiary on capacity building for the prevention of trafficking of children.

9. **Calamity Assistance.** Families affected by the typhoon “Vinta” in December 22, 2017 were beneficiaries of relief and rehabilitation. Provision of sleeping beds, groceries, clothing, hygiene, bottled water and construction materials for house repair.



10. **Other local Bodies.** The Executive Director was given a seat as a member of the Board of Directors of two non-government organizations. MALISA Home is a German funded non-government organization for girls who are victims of Human Trafficking. Philippine Mental Health Association (PMHA) Cagayan Chapter belongs to a national organization that envisioned that every Filipino lives in peace.
